INJUNCTION NOT WORKABLE IN THIS STATE

So Rickard and His Crew Proceed with Plans for Staging Title Bout.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 15.—Injunction proceedings brought in the courts of Indiana to hold up the Dempsey-Tunney fight will have no legal effect in Pennsylvania and, therefore, will not result in stopping the "Battle of the Requin". This was the view expressed here yesterday by Attorney General Woodruff, who was in Philadelphia in connection with another case.

The injunction was issued at Indianapolis by Judge Clinton H. Dixon of the Indiana Superior court. It was obtained by E. C. Clement, president of the Chicago Coliseum club, who claims to hold a contract with Dempsey to fight Harry Wills, Negro contender, in Chicago, before the signing of any other championship contract.

"The Indiana courts," said the attorney general, "did not issue an order against the Sequi-continental Association, or the Pennsylvania Athletic commission, which authorized the bout. This seems to be a matter between Dempsey and the Chicago club, and it is subject to punishment in Indiana."

"From a legal standpoint the Indiana injunction has no force in the Pennsylvania courts. It will be necessary for the plaintiff to appeal to the Federal courts or to bring proceedings in this state if he wishes to make his injunction effective."

"This bout has been duly sanctioned by the Pennsylvania state authority to deal with such matters. It has complied with the requirements of the state law and is in good standing. 
